1. **WELCOME** to the new year and the first newsletter of 2004. I am pleased to say that the Newsletter plays an important part in keeping our members informed about the Society, but it does not take the place of personal contact. While we realise it is difficult for older members of the community to travel long distances, we only have three or four meetings each year, and most of us have cars, and would be willing to bring other members who live nearby. We hope that more members will avail themselves of our excellent speakers.

3. PROFILE ... JUDITH SHAPIRA. (Your Newsletter Editor).

My father's family arrived in Melbourne around 1850, and my mother arrived in Brisbane with her parents and siblings in 1912, so it was obvious that I should be born and educated in Sydney. My father had shops in the city, and my mother was involved with most of the Jewish women's organizations that existed in the 1930's – 40's in Sydney. I attended Sydney Girls' High School, and then did the Leaving Certificate from SCEGGS Darlinghurst, which was my initiation into how 99% of the Australian population thought and felt in those days during World War II.

My Jewish education began at the Central Synagogue (of which my father was a foundation member of the Grosvenor Street shule) and later at the Great Synagogue, where I was Batmitzvah in the late Rabbi Porush's first Batmitzvah class. Later I joined the Great Synagogue choir (then mixed), of which my aunt Ruth Portrate was the leader. I was an active member of the GSY Intermediate Group until I went to Sydney University (1947), when I became involved with the Zionist Youth League, and later Haborim. I did an Arts degree, majoring in English, History and Psychology, never intending to use it. I was going to Israel as a "halutza" (pioneer), and these were heady days in the Zionist world. I spent a year on the Hachshara Training Farm, near Shepparton, (Victoria), where I met and later married the Manager, Miron Shapira. Miron arrived in Australia in 1947, having served three years in the British Army (Palestine contingent), and studied Agriculture at Hawkesbury Agricultural College, from where he became the Farm Manager for the Zionist Federation. Our first child Deborah was born while we lived in Shepparton, and we moved to Sydney to become shopkeepers in a hardware/newsagency in suburban Sydney when our second child Jonathan was one year old. We stayed there for nine years, (another addition to the family, Betsy), and in 1967, I answered an advertisement to "Come Back to Teaching", urging Uni graduates to help relieve the teacher shortage. After one month's training, I was employed as a full time casual teacher at Ryde High School, later completing a Diploma of Education at night. I was appointed Head Teacher of English and History at Riverside Girls' High School, Gladesville, from where I retired after 14 years.

Since retirement, I attended the Yad Vashem course for Teachers of the Holocaust, having been one of the founding members of the group which produced the Teaching the Holocaust Kit for Australian schools. I was the Chairman of the NSW Board of Deputies Education Committee for eight years, and later a member of the Public Relations Committee. I was an active member of the Speakers Panel of the Board, going out to schools and clubs all over Sydney speaking on many aspects of Judaism and Jewish history.

My husband and I have been members of B'nai B'rith for over twenty years, and I was President of the Anti-Defamation Unit for two years. I am now very involved with *Courage to Care* which is a travelling Exhibition to NSW country areas telling of those people who saved Jews during the Holocaust at risk of their own lives, to show that one person can make a difference, and to promote tolerance and anti-racism.

I have been Vice-President of this Society for four years, and this year is my third as Editor of the Newsletter. We have three children and six grandchildren.

4. **AN ADDENDUM FROM MORRIS FORBES.** In vol. XIII Part 2 there is an article by Mr. Forbes on Sir Julian Salomons, which mentions (on page 222) his wit and character. Here is another example of the man's sense of humour. Mr. Forbes writes: "Salomons was a contemporary of Sir Samuel Griffiths, the first Chief Justice of the High Court of Australia. On the publication by Griffiths of a translation by him of Dante's *Inferno*, he gave copies to a number of friends, including Salomons. The translation was not particularly notable, and Salomons recorded it thus: 'I thanked him and told him that I fully appreciated the great honour, but I asked him to inscribe his name upon the fly leaf, with a line showing that he had given it to me, as I told him, I should not like anyone to think that I had borrowed the book, nor should I like anyone to think that I had bought it.' "

5. ON A SAD NOTE... In the last Newsletter, I wrote that we wished our longtime former Treasurer, Miriam Solomon, a speedy recovery from her operation, and hoped that she would soon be attending our committee meetings again. About a week later, we heard that Miriam had died suddenly after a very brief illness. Her son, Rabbi Mark Solomon, delivered a eulogy at our Annual Meeting, and we will print an obituary in the next Journal. I had known Miriam since our days in the Great Synagogue Choir together, in the contraltos. We will all miss her very much indeed. The AJHS thanks Vanda Phillips for her donation in memory of Miriam.

We were also saddened to learn of the death of Peter Elias of the Hobart Hebrew Congregation. Peter had, with his wife, recently completed the history of the community and had welcomed many Society members to the celebrations in Hobart in May, 2003.

6. RESTORATION OF MONTEFIORE HEADSTONES by Morris Ochert OAM

There have been several references to the achievements of the Montefiore family in the AJHS Journals, especially Vol.8 Part 4 – 1977 by Ruth Faerber which also had a photo of the monument of E.L. Montefiore, No.402 in the old Jewish Section of the Rookwood Cemetery. A subsequent photo showed that it was in an enclosure in which was the headstone of his wife, Esther Hannah. On her grave is also a “footstone”, rarely provided; in this case it is a small version of her headstone with only her initials and the date of her death, as follows: “E.H.M. 1882”. All three stones needed attention.

More recently I found that, in the years since the photo was taken (1977), no action had been taken to restore the monuments. It cannot be ascertained for how long before 1977 they had been neglected. Though I am diffident about interfering in interstate communal affairs, I decided that the memorials must be restored. My letters to people in Sydney, whom I thought would be interested, brought no results. I then approached a member of the Montefiore family in England for the necessary funds and was advised to “contact family members in Australia.” However I recalled the negative response I had from them years ago when I sought data for my research on “The Montefiore-Rothschilds of Queensland and decided to spare myself any repetition.

The Trustees of the Art Gallery of New South Wales, of which Eliezer was a founder, agreed to fund the restoration of his monument, while the Jewish Cemetery Trust funded that of his wife. I express my appreciation to both Trusts. They have each performed a Mitzvah.

The work was carried out in late 1997. I hope, if the monuments of other Jewish folk are seen to need restoration that people of goodwill will come forward and attend to them. Who knows whether any of us, now living, may need some kindly attention to our monument, in years to come?

This article is particularly relevant as we are about to have the grave of Mordecai Moses restored, having recently received the correct Hebrew inscription for it from Rabbi Apple.
